GOOD NEWS FROM SYBIL NOVINSKI'S OFFICE is that contrary to predictions of declining enrollments in private schools in the 1980s, the total student population at UD is up approximately 14 percent for the second consecutive year. Sybil expects the final head count to be around 2,670 students, which compares with 2,340 students in the fall of 1970 and 2,030 students in the fall of 1978.

The University's undergraduate enrollment is up three percent and liberal arts graduate enrollment is up eight percent. The most dramatic rise was a 26 percent enrollment increase in the GSM. That figure is also the continuation of an upward trend. This year's GSM enrollment of 1,305 is up 56 percent from the 1978 tally.

Freshmen at the University number 302, making them the second largest freshman class in UD history. Statistics from Dan Davis (Admissions) indicate that 59 percent of the new freshmen were in the top quarter of their high school classes and 76 percent were in the top half.
