DR. SVETOZAR PEJOVICH, Acting President, will present a free lecture on "Inflation: The Causes, Effects and Remedies" tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the Gorman Faculty Lounge. All faculty and staff members are invited to attend to hear an explanation of the number one problem plaguing our daily lives.

THE BRONZE AGE OF CHINA IS COMING and UD faculty and staff members have an opportunity to enroll in a mini-course delving into the significant aspects of this important exhibit which opens at the Kimbell Art Museum in December. The three week lecture series will run on consecutive Thursdays at 7:30 p.m. in Lynch Auditorium beginning Nov. 6. Participants in the program include Emily Sano, curator of Oriental Art at the Kimbell; Frances Robb, art historian and consultant to the Kimbell; and Dr. Judith Whitbeck, professor of Asian art and art history at UTD. This special exhibit of the Bronze Age is a result of the excavation of the massive burial vault of China's first emperor, Ch'in Shih Haung Ti, the man who commissioned the building of the Great Wall.

Callen has written "Pinch," "The Deadly Mandrake," "Sorrow's Song" and "The Muskrat War." His stories describe the adventures of Pinch Grimball and his friends in the small bayou town of Four Corners. The characters and their values stem from Callen's own memories of growing up in South Louisiana.
