The forum will study the report, "A Nation at Risk." Gregory recently attended a regional Southeastern forum in Houston sponsored by the Department of Education.

Father FREDERICK JELLY, O.P., adjunct professor of theology, participated recently in the visitation of Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis. The reverend, two bishops, one Dominican provincial and American Seminary rector visited the seminary as one of the teams appointed to conduct visitations of seminaries in the United States mandated by Pope John Paul II. Jelly's own special area of evaluation in the visitation was academics and the library. These visitations will continue during the next two years until every theologate in the nation has been evaluated. This includes the theology program at UD since it serves Holy Trinity Seminary.

Dr. LASZLO BAKSAY, associate professor of physics, gave an invited report about "A Tracking and Imaging Cerenkov Counter to Measure the Muon-Neutrino Mass" on Oct. 13 at the University of Pittsburgh.
